ABOUT THE DIVISION OF STUDENT AFFAIRS

The Division of Student Affairs provides services, programs, facilities and learning opportunities which enhance the academic experience of the student and encourage intellectual, physical, cultural, moral and social growth to augment professional development. Faculty, staff, alumni and the local community each perform vital components in the overall educational process. Permeating the mission is the desire to provide a comprehensive program and campus community where students can develop a sense of personal values, integrity and global concern for humanity. The Division of Student Affairs includes the offices of Athletics, Bookstore, Campus Ministries, Campus Police, Career Placement, Student Development, Housing and Residence Life, Greek Life, Judicial Affairs, Multi-Cultural Affairs, Student Activities and Intramurals, Summer Conferencing, Outdoor Recreation, and Facilities Management.

STUDENT LEADERSHIP

The Division of Student Affairs promotes the development of student leadership through the following annual initiatives: leadership retreats, Q&A luncheon forums, club sponsors & presidents appreciation

HONOR SYSTEM

CAVS CARDS

The CAVS Card is the official student identification card for UVa-Wise. Cards are issued in the Division of Student Affairs Office located on the lower-level of Cantrell Hall for a \$5 fee. CAVS Cards are non-transferable.

The CAVS Card serves as a library card, athletic pass, meal card, and a vending card. The CAVS Card allows students to deposit monies in an account at the Cashier's Office and use their CAVS Card "just like cash" for purchases in the Bookstore, from campus vending machines and for laundry machines. There is a \$5 charge for replacement cards.

CAMPUS ACTIVITIES

A student activities calendar is compiled and distributed each semester and is available from the Coordinator of Student Center and Student Activities.

CLUBS AND ORGANIZATIONS

UVa-Wise provides a variety of clubs and organizations to enhance student life. Students also are encouraged to explore the creation of clubs and organizations not currently on campus.

Administration of Justice Club (Psi Chi Omega) is open to any and all students majoring or minoring in administration of justice or a social science. *Advisors: George Michael, Yenli Yeh*

The American Choral Directors Association student chapter is an organization open to all students interested in conducting and teaching choral music. *Advisor: TBA*

Amnesty International is a human rights organization that works for the freedom of political prisoners worldwide. The non-profit organization campaigns for the rights of women and children and educates the public about equal rights protection. The group monitors human rights violations and leads its members in letter writing campaigns to foreign governments. *Advisor: Cindy Wilkey.*

The Art Guild is for student and community artists and art lovers. It encourages participation in and appreciation of the visual arts. *Advisor: Ray Stratton.*

Association for Computing Machinery (ACM) is a professional organization which encourages and enhances learning in computing. *Advisor: Alex Edwards.*

The Baptist Student Union is a student-led organization that provides opportunities for personal growth as well as service and ministry to others. Membership is open to all students. *Director: Rev. James Collie.*

Campus Judicial Board. The campus judicial system is designed to encourage accountability by stressing the relationship inherent between individual action and consequences. The campus judicial system is comprised of three levels: administrative hearing or settlements, campus judicial hearing board, and the appeals process. The Board is comprised of six members: three residential students, two commuter students, and the Director of Student Affairs. There are two alternates selected. *Advisor: Jeff Howard.*

The **Cavalettes** are a dance group which adds additional spirit and enthusiasm to athletic and other community activities. *Advisor: Brenda Craft.*

The Cavalier Pep Band is a group that performs for home football and basketball games. It provides musical and cheering energies to animate athletes and spectators alike. *Director: Richard Galyean.*

Cheerleaders are selected by a panel of judges to promote student spirit and interest at College athletic functions. *Advisor: Brenda Craft.*

College Republicans encourages college men and women to take an interest in public affairs and politics and to affiliate with a specific political party. *Advisor: Gary Stratton.*

Commuter Club (COMTRA) is an organization of commuter students promoting fellowship among commuter students and bringing attention

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to the needs of commuters. The Commuter Club also provides support for students transferring from community colleges, as well as commuter students who are entering UVa-Wise as freshmen. The Commuter Club campaigns for and supports programs that are beneficial to UVa-Wise, and in particular to commuter students. Membership is open to all students.

The Concert Band performs a wide variety of original wind band literature and orchestral transcriptions. *Director: Richard Galyean*

The Darden Society is named for Colgate W. Darden, Jr., former governor of Virginia and former president of The University of Virginia, whose belief in higher education and love for Southwest Virginia brought him to lend support essential to the founding and growth of UVa-Wise. The oldest honor society at the College, Darden Society membership is based upon high scholarly achievement and intellectual promise. Sophomores become eligible for membership by achieving the Dean's List of Distinguished Students their first three semesters at the College. White water rafting, mountain climbing, horseback riding, and snow skiing are a few of the trips that take place during the semester. The Residence Hall Association is an organization of elected residence hall students who voice the concerns of residence hall students to the College administration, provide various activities in the residence halls, and promote a positive living and learning environment for residence hall students. Sigma Zeta is a national honorary society for students majoring in mathematics and science. The College is the Alpha Zeta Chapter. The Society for Creative Anachronisms is devoted to the study of pre-17th century Western culture, concentrating on the European Middle Ages and Renaissance. Members work to create the arts and skills of this era. An anachronism is something that is out of its proper time frame, and creative anachronism takes the best qualities of the Middle Ages and selectively recreates them in the modern world. The Society for History and Philosophy is devoted to a study of history and philosophy and offers such activities as lectures, historical programs, and field trips. The Student Activities Board (SAB) plans and implements a comprehensive student entertainment schedule. Dances, concerts,

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movies, comedians, magicians, and guest speakers are just some of the activities that take place every semester. All College students are welcome on the SAB, and officer elections are held each September.

The Student Virginia Education Association is a campus organization designed for students who want to teach. This organization includes students who plan to teach PK-3, 4-8, secondary and special education. Membership is open to any College student interested in the teaching profession. The Sullivan Society is an organization created by UVA-Wise students and faculty to bring together people of the Catholic faith and others whose beliefs are influenced by the teachings of Catholicism. The organization seeks to provide a friendly and understanding haven for those whose Christian beliefs play an important role in their lives. UVA-Wise Ambassadors work in association with the Office of Admissions to provide guidance to prospective students and their families. An Ambassador's primary responsibilities include giving campus tours, hosting Open House programs, acting as a mentor for freshmen during orientations and the first semester, and promoting school spirit on and off campus. Members are chosen through faculty references and interviews. *Advisor: Whitney Minor.*

The UVA-Wise Chamber Singers is an auditioned choir that performs music from the Renaissance to the present. *Director: TBA*

The UVA-Wise Choir Club is an extra-curricular organization that supports the choral organizations on and off campus. It is open to everyone interested in the UVA-wise choral groups. *Advisor: TBA*

The UVA-Wise Concert Choir is a larger, mixed chorus that performs varied music, sacred and secular. Open to all students. *Director: TBA*

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UVa-Wise Step Team was founded in 2002 and practices the art of stepping. Stepping is a line dance which consists of a set of intricate beats executed with drill team precision. The Step Team performs at various events around campus. *Advisor: TBA*

The Wesley Foundation is a campus ministry of the United Methodist Church. All students are invited and welcomed to take part in its ministry and activities. Located across the street from the main campus, the Wesley Foundation hosts a weekly home-cooked dinner and inspirational program on Tuesday nights. Prayer groups, study groups, weekend activities, weekly worship service and community service opportunities are also offered. The Wise Renaissance Revellers is a Renaissance performance troupe comprised of recorder players, madrigal singers, women's a cappella ensemble, English country dancers and English country dance band musicians. CULTURAL ACTIVITIES

UVa-Wise demonstrates its commitment to the liberal arts by fostering a variety of cultural and artistic experiences for students. Major activities include the Dock Boggs Festival, the Cohen Concert and Lecture Series, the Colgate Darden Lecture Series, the Woodrow Wilson Visiting Fellows Program, the University Fellow Program, and Pro-Art Association plays, concerts, dance performances and lectures. The Entertainment Committee also provides a variety of activities and concerts, all of which are free to all students.

PRO-ART ASSOCIATION

The Pro-Art Association is an organization whose purpose is to bring cultural events from all over the world to Wise County and the surrounding areas. In recent years the Association has presented concerts, musicals, storytellers, ballets and many other programs at the schools and institutions of higher education to this region. In the year 2003-04 alone, events held at UVa-Wise included the Talich String Quartet, Opera a la Carte, Mark Twain & the Laughing River, The Legend of the Poinsettia, The White Cliffs and The Legend of Rock and Roll. All students are encouraged to attend these activities and are given free admission to any Pro-Art event.

SOCIAL EVENTS AND MEETINGS

Student organizations or groups of students wishing to schedule an *on-campus* event must complete a student activity request form, which requires approval of appropriate College personnel at least one week in advance. All campus facilities must be scheduled through the Special Events Coordinator who maintains the official calendar of events. Student activity request forms are available from the Coordinator of Student Center and Student Activities.

“TOWN AND GOWN” COLLABORATION

The College co-sponsors a series of performing programs with the Pro-Art Association. Each year some 12 concerts, operas, ballets, orchestras, choirs, and Shakespearean plays are presented. Most performances are by renowned companies such as Joffrey II, Pittsburgh Opera Theatre,

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Boys Choir of Harlem, and the New York Gilbert & Sullivan Players. They take place at the auditorium of J.J. Kelly High School in Wise, a five-minute drive from the College, or other nearby locations.

In addition to the concert series, the William B. Cohen Memorial Arts Series takes place on the College campus. Established in memory of Mr. Cohen, friend and benefactor of Pro-Art and UVa-Wise, the series consists of performing and visual arts programs including plays, chamber players, vocal recitals, visual arts workshops, and lectures. Admission to all Pro-Art programs is free to all College students.

ATHLETICS

UVa-Wise offers every student an opportunity to engage in sports as both a participant and a spectator. UVa-Wise, a member of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) Division II, Appalachian Athletic Conference and Mid South Conference, sponsors 14 intercollegiate sports.

Women's sports are: basketball, volleyball, tennis, cross country, softball, and track & field. Men's sports are: basketball, baseball, football, tennis, cross country, golf, and track and field.

Students with a valid CAVS card are admitted without charge to all home athletic events, excluding NAIA tournaments.

THE BOOKSTORE

The official retail outlet for all required books and supplies, the Bookstore also carries reference books, insignia clothing, computer software, stationery and greeting cards, snacks, and other student supplies. Other items and services available include special occasion campus balloon delivery, and Artcarved class rings and announcements. For items not stocked, special orders may be placed.

CAMPUS POLICE

UVa-Wise maintains its own 24-hour-a-day Campus Police Department. Campus Police are responsible for the safety of all students, faculty, staff and visitors. The College's seven full-time officers, who are trained in law enforcement and certified by the Department of Criminal Justice Services, are empowered to enforce all state and local laws.

The Campus Police office is located in Cantrell Hall. Campus Police can be reached during office hours by calling the office at 328-0166 or 328-0190, and after hours via the mobile line at 328-COPS (328-2677).

Campus Police Emergency Call Boxes. Five emergency call boxes are located on campus and may be activated by pushing a button. The

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activated call box will automatically ring the Campus Police and the blue light on top of the call station will flash, indicating an activated alarm. Caller should give the necessary emergency information to the officer and, if possible, remain at the call box until an officer arrives. Boxes are in place at the following locations: behind the Theatre, between Cantrell Hall and Thompson Hall; the commuter parking lot on top of the hill; the top of the steps between the Wyllie Library and Zehmer Hall; two locations in the freshman parking lot at the stadium. Tampering with these units or making false emergency calls is strictly prohibited. Violators will be subject to disciplinary action.

THE CENTER FOR STUDENT DEVELOPMENT

CAREER DEVELOPMENT

Career Development offers programs, services and information to students and alumni to assist in developing and implementing career goals. Services include a resource library, self assessment tests, computer programs, and graduate school information. Individual career counseling is also available to help students decide on a major, choose a career, learn job search techniques, and research graduate schools. A variety of workshops are offered each semester on topics such as résumé and cover letter writing, networking, job search skills, and preparing for life after graduation. Job listings are posted for part-time and full-time openings, summer employment, internships, fellowships, and cooperative education opportunities through the web site.

COUNSELING SERVICES

UVA-Wise has two full-time counselors on staff. Counseling services are available to all students whether they are full- or part-time, commuter or campus resident. Services available to students, faculty and staff through counseling services include: individual counseling, group counseling, referrals, crisis intervention, and programming. The Counseling Center is also responsible for such activities as AIDS Awareness, Alcohol Awareness, and Safe Fall and Spring Break.

HEALTH SERVICES

Student fees provide for the services of a registered nurse each weekday from 8 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. Norton Community Hospital provides an R.N. in the UVA-Wise Office of Health Services. These services are free to students and include an assessment by the R. N. and over-the-counter medication.

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Additional services are available through Community Physicians Services Corporation. All charges incurred off campus are the responsibility of the student and/or the student's insurance company.

All incoming students are required to have a Pre-Entrance Health Form on file in the Counseling and Health Services office prior to registration. Each student must also provide documentation of immunizations signed by a health care provider. All students are required to provide proof of insurance prior to registration. A student insurance plan can be purchased to cover accidents and hospitalizations. Students who do not have a Pre-Entrance Health Form on file and proof of insurance may not be treated and may be denied registration.

STUDENT SERVICES

DINING HALL AND SNACK BAR

Dining Services provides cafeteria meals and operates Papa Joe's Grill in the Slemp Student Center. A meal plan program is available to all students. Residential students must purchase a plan; non-residential

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students may purchase a plan.

Meals are served daily throughout each semester except during breaks (fall, Thanksgiving, winter, and spring). During breaks, students who remain on campus must make other arrangements for meals. The meal program begins when the residence halls open and ends on the last day of exams for each semester. Three meal plans are offered:

The Cavalier Plan is available to residential students in Henson, McCrary, and Martha Randolph halls and to non-residential students. This plan provides access to 19 meals served weekly.

The Red & Gray Plan is available to residential students in Asbury and Thompson Halls, Theme Houses and Townhouses, as well as to non-residential students. This plan provides access to any 12 meals weekly.

The Declining Balance Plan is available to all non-residential students or as an “extra” plan for residential students. It offers \$25 increments to be used in any Dining Services facility. These plans can meet most or all special dietary needs. Prices are listed on page 21 of the catalog.

Meals are provided on a continual basis to accommodate any class schedule. Servings are unlimited. During lunch and dinner there is a choice of two entrees, three vegetables (includes one carbohydrate), desserts, a salad bar, deli bar, ice cream bar, two soups, and specialty bars. Meal exchanges are available in Papa Joe’s Snack Bar.

CAMPUS MAIL SERVICES

Campus Mail Services, located in Slemp Student Center, is the depository for student, faculty and staff mail. All students may register for a campus mailbox at Campus Mail Services. Residential students are given first priority. All correspondence should be addressed as follows:

STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT

The University of Virginia’s College at Wise is a community of scholars in which the ideals of freedom of inquiry, freedom of thought, freedom of expression, and freedom of the individual are sustained. The

College is committed to preserving the rights guaranteed to individuals by the Constitution. However, the exercise and preservation of these freedoms and rights require a respect for the rights of all in the academic community to enjoy them to the same extent. It is clear that in a community of learning, willful disruption of the educational process, destruction of property, and interference with the orderly process of the College or with the rights of other members of the College cannot be condoned. Students enrolling in the College assume an obligation to conduct themselves in a manner compatible with the College's function as an educational institution. To fulfill its functions of imparting and gaining knowledge, the College retains the authority to maintain order within the College and to exclude those who are disruptive of the educational process.

Students of the College are expected to conduct themselves in a manner befitting a civilized society, both within the College and elsewhere. For student conduct which is outside the jurisdiction of the Honor Court but which tends to discredit or injure the College, the Chancellor is authorized by the President of The University of Virginia to impose such penalty as deemed appropriate, including expulsion from the College. The Chancellor has delegated this authority to the Vice Chancellor for Administration and the Campus Judicial Board. The College reserves the right to suspend, enforce the withdrawal of, or expel a student who violates the Standards of Conduct. JUDICIAL SYSTEM

The Judicial System of The University of Virginia's College at Wise is designed to support the purpose and mission of the College. A fundamental premise of the system is that students are expected to act responsibly so that each student has the opportunity to grow intellectually, spiritually, physically and socially. The System also is designed to encourage accountability by stressing the relationship inherent between individual action and consequences. The System is intended to be educational in nature rather than punitive. Due process is a fundamental ingredient of the System, yet this principle should not be confused with the legal restrictions associated with criminal courts of law. The principles of fairness and reasonableness serve as foundations for the System. The full text of the Judicial System can be found in the Student Handbook located at www.uvawise.edu.

SEXUAL HARASSMENT POLICY

UVa-Wise strives to provide a working and educational environment for all faculty, staff and students that is free from sexual harassment. Sexual harassment in any form is unacceptable behavior and will not be tolerated. It is a form of misconduct that undermines the institutional mission of the College. ALCOHOL AND OTHER DRUGS POLICY

UVa-Wise does not condone the illegal or otherwise irresponsible use of alcohol and other drugs. It is the responsibility of every member of the College community to know the risks associated with substance use and abuse. This responsibility obligates students and employees to know relevant College policies and federal, state and local laws and to conduct themselves in accordance with these laws and policies. To these ends, the College publishes the following information regarding College policies and sanctions: laws and penalties concerning substance use and abuse, health and behavioral risks of drug use, and resources for treatment and educational programming.

DRUG-FREE WORKPLACE POLICY

The use of alcohol by employees while on UVa-Wise owned or controlled property, including meal periods and breaks, is absolutely prohibited except when authorized by the College for approved College functions. No employee will report to work while under the influence of alcohol or illegal drugs. Violations of these rules by an employee will be reason for evaluation/treatment for a substance use disorder or for disciplinary action up to and including removal. This policy applies to all employees (full-time, part-time, students, etc.).

SOLICITORS AND SALESPERSONS

Solicitors and salespersons, except those on official business with the College, are not permitted on campus except with the permission of the Chancellor or designee.

VEHICLES

All vehicles and motorcycles parked on campus must display a valid parking decal. Vehicle information is provided in the *Vehicle Rules & Regulations* brochure available in the Campus Police Department.

An annual parking fee of \$48 will be charged to all full-time faculty, staff, and students. Part-time faculty, staff, and students will be charged

an annual fee of \$24. Each secondary use vehicle within the same household can be registered for an annual fee of \$5. A limit of three vehicles may be registered. A valid parking decal and *Vehicle Rules & Regulations* brochure are provided upon registration.

Signs stating the 25-mph speed limit are posted throughout campus. Individuals ticketed for exceeding the speed limit may be referred to Municipal Court in addition to any action taken by the College.

All visitors desiring to park their vehicle on College property must register their vehicle with the Campus Police Department. A temporary parking permit will be issued to the visitor at no cost. Visitors must comply with the Vehicle Rules and Regulations.

RESIDENCE HALL GUIDELINES

In keeping with the policy of The University of Virginia, housing assignments are made without discrimination by reason of age, citizenship, color, handicap, political affiliation, race, religion, sex, sexual orientation, national origin, or status as a disabled veteran or veteran of the Vietnam era.

The College reserves the right to make additional regulations necessary for the protection of property and for the safety, health, comfort, and convenience of all residents at any time.

Changes in the Terms and Conditions may be recommended by the occupants and/or resident staff. Recommended changes must not be contrary to established College policy and must be approved by the proper authority.
